*From the Desk of Mayor David Runfeldt*

I have stated many times in the past that I feel one of the primary objectives of municipal government, it's employees and elected officials is to be accountable and accessible to residents.

It is the policy of the Borough of Lincoln Park to quickly and efficiently respond to complaints from the public through immediate remediation of complaints, in depth analysis to eradicate future problems and to ensure department head accountability in providing quick and efficient services.

The Borough of Lincoln Park has instituted a tracking and coordination system, called CitiStat, to monitor citizen complaints, incidents reported from other agencies and all other incidents that come to light that are clearly within the purview of Lincoln Park Municipal Government.

We have excellent services available in the borough, and what CitiStat does is further install a way to be accountable to every department head, which will lead to truly responsible governing. Now that CitiStat is fully implemented and on our Web site, our residents can report any quality of life issue such as road and sidewalk repair issues, graffiti, potholes, juvenile delinquency, and zoning violations among others which will reach the appropriate department head. The department head will then have 72 hours to address the issue in one of several ways.

They can either fix the problem, or if the problem will take longer than 72 hours to resolve, the borough will notify the resident who made the entry with a time frame for completion. If the problem is going to be a long-term one and involves the DPW, the police department, or fire department, we will keep the resident in the loop at least every 30 days to let them know that we are working on it, so at least the residents are aware that we are working on the solution.

In addition to helping to resolve quality of life issues that are important to you, we anticipate that this tracking system will enable us to identify trends and evaluate recurring problems which could lead to permanent correction and lower costs associated with addressing chronic problems.

Residents can log in concerns using the CitiStat program by visiting the borough's web-site [www.lincolnpark.org](http://www.lincolnpark.org) and clicking on "Submit a Work Order." While on the site, make sure to also sign up for the borough's email newsgroup service which sends important information and news about town and civic events directly to your email inbox.

## New Laws & Pending Legislation

### New Laws:

A-1185: Authorizes public entities to implement energy savings improvement programs

A-1498: Daniel Mackey's law; requires certain information be given to next of kin of relatives killed or incapacitated in motor vehicles accident; caps certain abandoned vehicle storage fees

A-3186: Provides for adjustment and notice of date on which certain elections can occur if date coincides with period of religious observance

A-3481: Provides certain law enforcement officers and firefighters regain pay status when appeals of termination are not resolved within 180 days

S-1675: Allows UEZ municipalities to include certain homeland security expenses as eligible for funding from enterprise zone assistance fund.

### Pending Legislation:

A-1551: Establishes the "Health Workplace Act"

A-2558: Makes part-time elected and appointed officials ineligible for publicly paid health care benefits if they are in any way eligible for other health care coverage

A-3482: Defines and removes limits on municipal market to affordable programs

A-3486: Establishes certain ethics protocols for procurement of fire engines

A-3505: Clarifies that local units of government may enter into shared services agreement for a service that either one of them is authorized to provide

A-3632: Establishes "Smart Housing Incentives Act"

A-3656: Change title of animal cruelty investigator to "Municipal humane law enforcement officer" and defines them in statute

A-3661: "Assistance to Firefighters' Families Act" doubles State survivor pension amounts for beneficiaries of certain deceased volunteer emergency service providers; requires municipal life insurance and burial expenses for volunteer firefighters; permits fire code inspection surcharge

A-3704: Offers surviving spouse of TPAF or PERS member with 25 or more years of service choice of deferred pension instead of current return of contributions and non-contributory life insurance

A-3709: "New Jersey Public Water Supply Fluoridation Act"

A-3736: Amends the "Public Corruption Profiteering Penalty Act"

A-3740: Provides for regulation of small wind energy systems by municipalities

A-3801: Makes vendor certification as prerequisite to payment by local unit optional

A-3825: Expands range of local units eligible to join an insurance fund established by a municipality or county under certain circumstances.

A-3829: Prohibits the imposition of affordable housing need and related fees upon the local transfer or move of a business

S-2438: Requires filing of report comparing investment returns earned by private money managers and by State employees for public employee retirement funds and State of New Jersey Cash Management Fund

S-2525: Permits agreement by taxpayer and municipal tax assessor to modify an assessment to correct errors in certain circumstances

S-2546: Provides alternative handgun purchase permit application procedures for municipal police officers and members of State Police

S-2605: Exempts certain municipalities from certified recycling coordinator requirements

S-2651: Requires all wireless telephones and electronic communication devices issued by public entities to be activated to receive Amber Alerts

S-2659: Reduces number of paid holidays for all State and local government employees to parallel federal schedule

S-2682: Expands scope of review of Pension and Health Benefits Review Commission

S-2689: Requires pension loan interest rate in TPAF, PERS, JRS, PFRS and SPRS be no more than 4%

S-2711: Revises procedure for re-assessment of certain real property by assessor.

### **Congratulations and Continued Blessings**

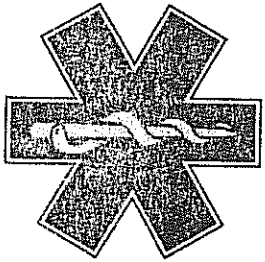

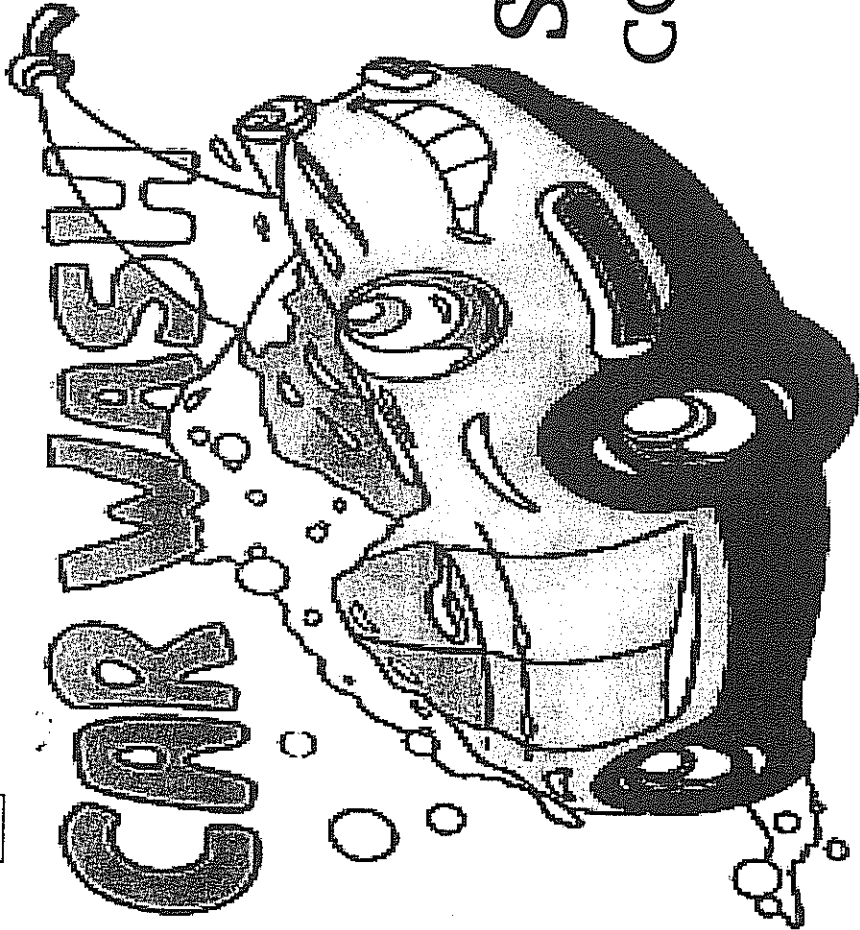
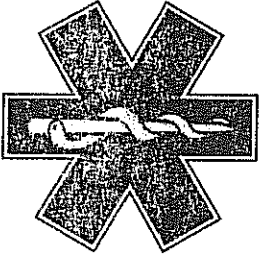

# HURRICANE SEASON IS HERE—June through September ARE YOU READY?

We all know that the hurricane season has started – the question is – are you prepared in the event that either a hurricane or tropical storm hits Lincoln Park?

Tropical Storms (Floyd was a tropical storm when it hit in 1999) and hurricanes can do significant damage and bring with them the following hazards: Flash flooding, river and stream flooding, wind damage, power outages. Here are some quick tips:

**Flash Flooding:** Remember, when a roadway is under water "Turn Around, Don't Drown". If you are experiencing flash flooding in your area keep a careful eye on the situation. If the water is encroaching your property please be sure you move important papers and personal belongings above ground level. Make sure that all light lawn furniture is secured. Do not attempt to drive through the water – wait until it recedes.

**River and Stream Flooding:** River and Stream flooding lasts much longer and has a greater chance of impact on personal property. If the streams and/or rivers are rising keep a close eye on the situation. Resources are listed below that will help you in determining what the situation is and what the potential might be. If evacuation is necessary please remember that we will do assisted evacuations only during daylight hours unless there is a medical emergency. It is always best to plan an evacuation route and prepare for evacuation ahead of time. Our shelter will be open during any tropical storm or hurricane event.

**Wind Damage:** Wind can cause a great deal of damage to your property. Take a look at your property and see if there are any trees that might be a problem during high winds. You may find it useful to take proactive steps if a condition exists that could damage your home or your neighbor's property. If you are going on vacation – or if a storm is predicted – please be sure to secure all lawn furniture and ornaments. Umbrellas, chairs, etc. can break windows and can damage cars when they are airborne.

**Power Outages:** Downed trees and wires can cause power outages that last for a long time. Should your power go out, shut off all appliances that were on with the exception of one light. This will let you know when the power comes back. Be sure you have surge protectors for all audio and video equipment as well as computers. Make sure that such equipment is powered down during an outage. Use only battery operated lamps and flashlights for lighting. Make sure you have a source to boil water that does not require electricity. Make sure you have water available since the storm may affect water pressure. **Cordless phones** do not operate during a power outage. The "old fashioned" phones will still be operable if telephone lines are unaffected. See if you can find an old one somewhere in the attic or basement and keep it handy. Be sure you have a car charger for cell phones as the outage may well last longer than the battery on your phone. **Refrigerators and freezers** should be kept closed as much as possible. Each time they are opened lessens the amount of time the food will stay good. Make sure all food from refrigerators and/or freezers is checked before using.

**Good things to have on hand:** bottled water; a hand operated can opener; lanterns, flashlights (battery operated); a portable radio; canned foods that do not require cooking.

- If you have Verizon phone service at home you may receive a "Reverse 9-1-1" call with recorded information. PLEASE do not hang up-listen to the message-this is information that you need to know.
