From the Desk of Mayor David Runfeldt

Lincoln Park Day will be Saturday, September 25th, 2010. In addition to the great events and activities planned by the wonderful volunteers of the Lincoln Park Day Association, we have a special happening this year. This year will feature a “Mayor’s Healthy Cook-Off”. Up to 15 Mayors from around the area will take part in an old fashioned Barbeque throw-down with the titles of “Healthiest”, “Best Tasting”, “Best Presentation” and “Best Overall” as part of the Mayor’s Wellness Campaign’s effort to promote healthier living and more active lifestyles.

Lincoln Park has been a part of the New Jersey Mayor’s Wellness Campaign since early 2007 when we held an employee weight loss competition as our first event. Since then we have held two weight loss competitions for residents, participated in walk-to-school days, installed walking tracks in and around the Lanes Field complex and received grants and donations to purchase exercise and recreation equipment at the Community Lake. The highlight of our participation over the last three years has been the Annual Beavertown Fall Classic 5K which is held the first Saturday in November each year. The Fall Classic has expanded each year and now includes a Kid’s Main Street Dash and a nearly 2 mile walking loop for those wanting to participate, but not quite ready to do a 5K run.

The Mayor’s Wellness Campaign supports Mayors as champions of community health. The goal is to increase opportunities for Lincoln Park residents to participate in physical activity with a long term goal of improving health, reducing deaths and the health care costs secondary to obesity.

Across New Jersey, people are getting sick and literally dying from obesity-related conditions. The problem is particularly acute in children. Recent studies link childhood obesity to a disturbing prediction: the current generation of children in America may have shorter life expectancies than their parents.

The communities in which we live can help us lead healthier lives, but only if efforts are made to encourage us to do so. Neighborhoods can either promote or inadvertently discourage the wellness of residents. Healthy communities are places where residents are safe to walk or bike and where children and adults can enjoy the parks and recreational opportunities, shoppers can purchase wholesome foods and everyone knows about the benefits of physical activity and healthy eating.

I encourage all Lincoln Park citizens to join me in learning more about this worthwhile effort by going to www.mayorswellnesscampaign.org and taking part in the initiatives we have started around town. Ideas are always welcome as well, so if you have one, please reach out and share it.

Remember to come out for Lincoln Park Day on Saturday, September 25th. See you there!

Police News

With today's economy not being that good, we are starting to see some burglaries in our area. I want to take this opportunity to point out some means of prevention so that we can avoid this type of crime in our residential and commercial areas.

The first thing to keep in mind is that burglary is a crime of opportunity. If you make their work difficult you stand a good chance of stopping them before they get in. Statistically, most homes are burglarized during daytime hours, when the burglars think no one is home. To a burglar visibility means vulnerability. Use picket or chain link fences. Keep hedges clipped down around waist level. Try not to leave any areas around your home where someone can hide.

Burglars try the doors and windows first. If burglars have difficulty here, chances are they will move on. A good door lock and the use of a deadbolt can be a great means of prevention. Remember though, a double cylinder deadbolt can also block your exit in an emergency.

It is also important to lock your windows.

Light is a great crime deterrent. Light up all dark areas, especially doors and windows.

Invest in a good alarm system. After installing an alarm, put signs in windows and entrances indicating your home is protected. Every alarm should include a fail safe battery backup.

Locks and alarms can't prevent a burglary unless they're in use. Establish a routine for locking doors and windows, as well as setting the alarm. It is also a good practice to lock your car doors, even if the vehicle is in the driveway.

Neighbors should look out for each other. If you see someone you don't notice on your neighbor's property, or even in the neighborhood, please don't hesitate to call the Police department.

If a burglar does break in, or even if you suspect something is wrong, please don't go in, but rather call the Police desk immediately. The best defense is to not give someone looking to commit this type of crime the opportunity to do it.

A Look Ahead

It seems not too long ago that we were bombarded in the press with fears of the H1N1 influenza pandemic. Long lines, delays in shipments and parents scurrying to find a clinic dominated headlines. Recently, the World Health Organization (WHO) published a clinical profile of the H1N1 influenza virus, compiled from studies over the past year.

The report appears in the New England Journal of Medicine, and affirms what was already suspected – the disease had its greatest toll on the young - infants, children and young adults. This is contrary to the seasonal influenza, which exerts its impact on the frail and elderly. Approximately, 90% of those who died from the H1N1 or its complications, were younger than 65, with hospitalization rates greatest in children under 5 years old, and lowest in the elderly. The report states that 25% to 50% of patients, who were hospitalized or died, had no coexisting medical condition. Although the virus was highly contagious, it was milder than previously anticipated.

The H1N1 virus is still circulating and will be one of the strains in the 2010-2011 seasonal influenza vaccine. Even if you received that H1N1 vaccine in the 2009-2010 season, you still need to get vaccinated again in the fall. Immunity from flu vaccines typically last 6 months. Also, the seasonal flu vaccine contains 2 other strains that are circulating. The CDC now recommends that everyone be vaccinated annually against the flu. In addition to the vaccine, good, common-sense practices can help protect you. They included frequent hand washing, cough etiquette, and social distancing when someone is ill.
