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Mayor Runfeldt's State of the Borough Address

January 2, 2011

I would like to welcome everyone here today for the Re-Organization meeting of the Lincoln park Borough Council. Along with my remarks today, I will be offering the annual "State of the Borough" Address that the Mayor is required to make annually. There are quite a few dignitaries here in the audience and I am going to defer the introduction of the dignitaries to Council President Pepe when he gives his address.

Congratulations Councilman Pepe on your re-election and re-appointment to the position of Council President. Congratulations too, Councilwoman Thompson on your re-election and to our newest Councilman, Robert Cardillo on your first foray into town government by winning your election to Council. I hope you find the position and responsibilities as challenging and rewarding as I did.

I would like to thank Pastor Rittenger for delivering the Invocation today.

I want to welcome and thank the County and State Representatives of ours who have made the time for us today. Your commitment to the residents of the Borough of Lincoln Park is always noticed and very appreciated. I personally look forward to furthering our relationship. As I have said many times in the past, we may be a small town on the edge of the County; however, as far as I am concerned Morris County starts here. We are worthy and deserving of all of the State and County resources available to any other town. The efforts of our County Freeholders, State Representatives and recently, the Governor's office, to provide these resources is greatly appreciated by myself, everyone up here today and most importantly by all the residents throughout town. I expect you will continue to do your best to deliver the great representation that we have come to expect from you.

I would like to acknowledge Councilman Wild, Kerwin, Petracca and Gemian who are in the midst of their terms. We have had a solid core up here and we have worked well together to do much good for the Borough of Lincoln Park. I know that Administration and Council will continue to work together to meet any challenges that lie ahead of us. I expect that you fell the same way.

Four years ago I pledged that Lincoln Park would be the "best, well managed, ethical and exciting" community. Over the last four years we have weeded out and prosecuted corruption. We have installed complete and updated employee practices and policies. Lincoln Park has been named the 5th best town to live in New Jersey and the 11th best town in the Country for a healthy retirement.

Our Police Department was one of the first in the County to achieve State Accreditation. We have achieved Sustainable Jersey certification, something only 12% of the towns in the State have been able to accomplish at this time. Our Mayor's Wellness Campaign played a significant role in improving the health of our community from the Annual 5K run that we hold to the facilitation of generous private donations to help make our recreational facilities more accessible and more exciting to more of our residents. We have formed an Economic Development Committee who has been tasked with exploring ways to promote, attract and retain businesses. While these are just a few of the many achievements administration and Council have made over the last four years, I would like to go into a little more detail on the events of this past year.

2010 started much as 2009 had any unfortunately much as 2011 is already. Which; is that we continue to find ourselves in some of the most economically challenging times many of us have ever seen. By the end of February last year, the Borough Council had made their final changes to the Municipal Budget I presented. At the time we had a budget that not only met all of the requirements of a fully compliant budget, but was actually less in spending than the year before. At the time we were notified that the State was reducing the amount of financial aid they give us by nearly a quarter of a million dollars. This was the 3rd year in a row that the State had reduced the amount of financial assistance they provide to us. In order to remain compliant we were forced to make additional cuts. Immediately, each department was given an amount they needed to cut and the Department Heads were trusted to dole out the cuts in the way they felt would achieve the necessary reduction in spending without sacrificing the services they provided to residents. I commend each of the Department Heads, their staffs, and everyone involved for helping to absorb these additional cuts. I am happy to report that even with this loss of revenue we have not been forced to sever any personnel nor cut services. Of particular note, thanks must be given to the Union membership from our two unions in town. They both partnered with the Borough to find a solution to the cuts. The unions' willingness to work with us allowed us to find a way out of the additional mess.

March 2010 in Lincoln Park was a month I am sure many of us would like to forget, but will always be remembered. It was then that we witnessed some of the worst flooding in our town's history. Events such as this put a community to a test. As high as the flood waters rose, I feel that we as a community climbed even higher. The amount of concern, care, support and positive attitude from the vast majority of town was evident throughout the storm and its aftermath. While we must all reflect on the damage done and the disruption to our friends and neighbor's lives, there is much we must be thankful for. Most important is the fact that in an emergency which affected nearly 600 homes in town, many times that number of residents – and a response from over 200 emergency personnel, we had no loss of life or even a major injury. Our new Governor, Chris Christie, showed great concern for the residents of Lincoln Park and elsewhere along the Passaic and Pompton river Basins by his opening clear channels of communication with members of his cabinet and his personal appearances in our area. Unlike 2007 when Lincoln Park was shut out of FEMA Public Assistance, Governor Christie and his staff complimented our efforts to insure that Lincoln Park received the resources it needed and deserved. In fact, due to the recommendation of Congressman Frelinghuysen, FEMA set-up their Regional disaster Assistance Center right here in Lincoln Park. I thank Congressman Frelinghuysen, Governor Christie and our State and County Officials who assisted during and after the flood. More importantly I look forward to the commitment that all of these individuals have made in helping explore ways to mitigate future flooding in the area.

We have the 2011 officers of our Fire Department here today to be sworn in. During an incident like the flooding we had in March. It is these men and the incredible volunteers that we have that do much of the work. Our Fire Department ran emergency operations for over 60 straight hours handling evacuations from over 150 homes and taking out over 200 individuals. In addition to the evacuations Lincoln Park responded to a house fire on the Wayne side of the Pompton River which Wayne was unable to reach.

Lincoln Park has some of the most well prepared, well trained and most professional Emergency Services in the county if not the entire State.

The Fire Department was supported by members of the Lincoln Park EMS who ran every call for the nearly three straight days of the event with the Fire Department along with medical calls of their own. Our Police Department and our CERT team were called into action early in the event operating throughout the entire time. There are many organizations, individuals and businesses that help out during emergencies like this far too many to thank here, but they all deserve our sincerest appreciation. Nearly all of the co-ordination of response and resources fall on the Lincoln Park Office of Emergency Management. OEM has been run by Mrs. Ellen Harrigan for the last several years. Unfortunately, 2010 is the last year that Mrs. Harrigan will be heading OEM. She has stepped down after leading this all important department for many years, including through the floods of 2001 and 2010. Mrs. Harrigan and Shelter Director Penny Smith, who has also stepped down, both deserve many thanks for the efforts they have made in helping the residents of Lincoln Park through some truly awful times. Ellen and Penny...thank you...your presence will be missed.

2010 saw the completion of our first full year of curbside recycling pick-ups. I am happy to report that this program continues to be a tremendous success. Environmentally, we have increased our recycling compliance from around 30% to above 80%. Financially, removing that amount recyclables from the trash stream has greatly reduced the amount we pay for trash

for trash disposal. Our recycling yard is cleaner, more efficient and more productive. Our DPW Superintendent, Tom Piorkowski and Recycling Coordinator, Kevin Mackey, were both the recipient of awards for changes to improving recycling efforts in Morris County.

Borough Engineer, Paul Darmofalski, and his staff have been digging through our codes and Ordinances in an attempt to find ways to make our building process more resident and business friendly, while at the same time protecting us from overdevelopment and balancing the many flood issues we have in town. We have already begun to see the fruits of these efforts in more streamlined application processes and the greater potential for residents in the flood plain to elevate their homes.

As we approach 2011, there is much to be excited about in Lincoln Park and there is much work to be done.

This year we will be held to a 2% CAP on increases in property taxation. I fully support the Governor's desire to impose this CAP and I applaud the fact that he and the legislature were able to put it in place for this year. Unfortunately, many of the "tool-kit" items that municipalities will need to help meet his CAP have not been passed as of yet. Also the 2% CAP has some exceptions which will allow taxes to ultimately increase by more than 2%. The danger in this is that the general public is expecting their taxes to not go up by more than 2%. However, I fear that when they see an increase of slightly more than 2%, they will again look at municipal officials as being over taxing and over spending, when this could not be further from the reality of the situation. I personally, would have preferred to see a hard 2.5% CAP, with no exceptions and passage of the tools towns need to make it work and the Governor had originally intended.

That being said, I am happy to report that with regards to our 2011 budget, we are fully in compliance with the new CAP and requirements as it stands now. This budget will be presented to Council in several days for their comments, cuts, additions and changes. One of the major ways we were able to achieve compliance was once again by partnering with the PBA to help reduce costs with overtime and days off. I thank the men and women of the PBA for their desire to help find solutions as we move into 2011.

Before closing I would like to make several acknowledgements and offering of thanks to a few people.

First, it is important to note that we have just completed a State of Emergency following last weeks snow and wind storm. I have to thank Tom Piorkowski and every member of the DPW for a tremendous job in keeping our streets clean. This was a particularly challenging storm and our residents noticed the fine job you did. Calls and emails I received were extremely more complimentary of the efforts.

Sean Canning has completed his first full year as our Administrator. I know that Sean is often tough on himself, but if he feels he's done half as well as I think he has, then he should be very pleased. In all seriousness, Sean has done a fantastic job as our Administrator. Not only am I thankful he is there, but the entire town appreciates it as well.

Kerry Geisler, our CFO has continued to bring professionalism, effectiveness and pride back to the financial department in town. I am proud to tell you that we have one of the best CFO's right here in Lincoln Park.

Our remaining Department Heads, Janet Cassidy from Parks and Rec., Sal Marino from Building and Development, Pat Pignatelli from health, tom Piorkowski from DPW, and Tom Andrascik from the Police Department round out what I have found to be the best Administrative staff in not just my 16 years in town government, but my 40 years as a resident. I thank each of you along with Borough Attorney Ed Buzak, Court Clerk Patricia Fritz, Municipal Clerk Penny Smith and my Aide, Ellen Ross, for being the great team that we are able to put out on the field every day to represent and serve the residents of our great town.

There are many, many more Borough employees that deserve to be recognized for being part of the team. Rather than name each one, I would like to offer a collective "thank You" to every employee on behalf of myself and all the residents for the great job that you do.

Lastly, I would like to thank my family. My parents Lyn and Dave who raised me with a sense of pride in my community an awareness of civic duty and a love of the political process. My brothers Erik and Michael, my beautiful daughters Brielle and Camryn and my wife Andrea, who is the centering force in my life.

Thank you all very much and have a very happy 2011.

News from Lincoln Park EMS

On February 2, Lincoln Park EMS was dispatched to assist with an explosion and large fire at Vreeland Tires in Parsippany. The volunteers of LPEMS assisted Parsippany by providing EMS care and Rehab for over 15 firefighters. Over the past decade, LPEMS has developed a Rehab program for Lincoln Park Fire Department, which has become a vital resource at large fires and other incidents. Special Operations Unit T1 is a trailer that contains communication equipment, a temporary climate controlled shelter, generators, an oxygen cascade system as well as other specialized medical equipment which allows us to rehydrate, monitor and treat emergency workers who are under a great deal of physical and mental stress. Through our connection with the Northeast Morris Mutual Aid Association, we have responded to provide Rehab at many large incidents throughout Morris County and have inspired other EMS organizations to develop their own Rehab program. We have also set up Rehab at other large planned events, such as the triathlon in Pequannock this past summer. Thanks to the following members who responded to Parsippany: Deputy Chief Donna Moeller, Lieutenant Jen Bononno, Rich VanOrden, Joe Lax and DJ Royce. Stormwater Management for Small Businesses in Morris County

Why do businesses need this information: This information aims to increase your stormwater management awareness and strengthen your knowledge. It will help you to manage the potential stormwater pollution problems at your place of business.

Benefits for you and your business: by addressing potential stormwater pollution problems at your workplace, you:

- Improve your business's profile
- Make long-term cost savings by increasing efficiency and reducing costs
- Increase customer patronage
- Improve environmental conditions for everyone
- Demonstrate compliance with the Environmental Protection Agency's Best Management Practices
- Minimize any potential for environmental fines

What is stormwater? Stormwater is rainwater that flows across hard surfaces such as streets, driveways, and parking lots and drains into catch basins in the street. Stormwater is not treated and flows directly into rivers, streams, and, eventually, to our oceans. Stormwater should only contain clean rainwater, *not* pollutants such as trash, sewage, pesticides, industrial waste, heavy metals, oils or greases.

What legislation governs stormwater pollution? Stormwater discharges are regulated by a number of different laws including the *Clean Water Act 1987*, *USEPA Phase II Rules 1999* and the *New Jersey Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NJPDES) Rules 2004*.

The new pollution discharge elimination rules offer the most specific protection for the state's waters. It prohibits the pollution of the stormwater system and our natural waters. The rules have general obligations which every person, business and industry must comply with as well as specific obligations for particular activities. Failure to comply with any of these obligations may result in the issuing of a fine and/or prosecution.

The water quality policy states that a person or a business should not discharge or deposit pollutants into any waters or onto land where it might enter any waters. The pollutants listed below, in part, relate to small business and industry:

- Air conditioning or cooling system waste water
- Carpet, upholstery, waste or dry cleaning agents

- Detergents and their by-products
- Fire sprinkler test water
- Oil, grease or lubricants
- Paint and paint scrapings
- Painting wash water
- Paint stripping waste
- Photographic chemicals
- Trash (e.g. cans, bottles, plastic items or materials)
- Street cleaning waste
- Wash water from cleaning
- Animal (e.g. enclosure) waste
- Wash water from cleaning parts, vehicles or any equipment
- Wash water from commercial or industrial premises
- Waste from grease traps

In addition, fertilizers, yard waste (e.g., lawn clippings, leaves), soil, clay, gravel or sand should not be discharged or deposited into any waters or dumped into stormwater catch basins. For more information on water quality programs visit: the EPA web site at www.epa.gov or the New Jersey web site at www.njstormwater.org

What can you do to stop stormwater pollution? Many operational practices can pollute stormwater. *The first step is to ensure that stormwater does not get contaminated as a result of your workplace activities.* Inspect the uncovered areas of your workplace and ask yourself: if when it rains will rainwater runoff become contaminated before it gets to the storm drain?

Keeping your work area clean:

- Prevent wash or rinse water from entering stormwater drains. Soap and detergents can contain phosphates and when allowed into storm drain systems can cause problems in our waterways, such as excess algae growth, toxic algal blooms and reduced oxygen levels for aquatic organisms. Confine your washing and cleaning to a contained area where wastewater is recycled or directed to a sanitary sewer. Use biodegradable phosphate detergents only.
- Keep your premises clean to stop unintentional pollution of the stormwater system. Your customers and staff will also appreciate a clean and tidy work area.
- Do not rinse off work floors unless all water can be collected or directed to an approved sanitary waste system
- If you cannot rinse without getting dirty water in storm drains, you have other cleaning options;

-vacuum or dry sweep the area

-use absorbent material to collect most of the grime and then use a solvent on a rag to remove the remaining grime

-consider painting work floors to prevent absorption of oil.

- Install cigarette butt receptacles for customers and workers
- Keep sidewalks and parking lots free of litter and debris. Place trash receptacles where customers can easily discard unwanted items. Empty trash receptacles as needed

Berming:

- A berm is a low wall built to contain liquids. It is usually made of an impervious material such as asphalt or concrete
- A berm should be large enough to hold the contents of the largest liquid container in the area plus an extra 20%. Bermed areas should be covered by a roof to prevent rain water from entering them and washing pollutants out.
- Should a spill occur it would be contained within a bermed area.

Controlling Site Erosion and Runoff: Activities such as clearing and excavation leave a site vulnerable to erosion and can put the local watershed at risk for storm-water runoff contamination. State or local regulations may require prescribed steps to minimize erosion and runoff during and after construction. A site's runoff rate should be the same during and after development as it was before clearing and construction. A site under development should be properly maintained to ensure that any storm-water runoff does not contain unwanted sediments, construction waste, or chemicals. It is up to the owner to ensure that precautions are being taken on site, through a reliable environmental engineer or the general contractor for the project.

Wash Bays:

- Wash vehicles only in an approved wash water recycler

Wash bays should connect either to a wash water recycler or to an underground storage tank that is emptied by a licensed contractor. The waste water must not drain to the stormwater system. Clean the wash bay regularly to prevent oil build-up.

- Use only degreasing compounds and detergents formulated to reduce the emulsification of oils and other hydrocarbons.
- Portable systems for treating wastewater prior to discharge are available; check the Yellow Pages for "Water Treatment & Equipment" *Continued on page 9*

LENTEN SEASON INFORMATION: Regulations: The entire season, from Ash Wednesday to the Mass of the Lord's Supper, is a penitential season; a time of self-denial, prayer and Christian charity. The specific discipline of the Church in the U.S. is as follows: Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence. Days of fasting and abstinence are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are **obligated** to fast. By this obligation, the individual is permitted only one full meal in the day. The obligation to abstain begins at age 14. The law of abstinence forbids the eating of meat. The obligation to observe the laws of fast and abstinence "substantially" or as a whole is a serious obligation. Failure to observe any one penitential day in itself is not considered serious; however, it is the failure to observe any penitential days at all, or a substantial number of such days, which must be considered serious.

Stations of the Cross: The ancient custom of the church to remember Jesus' passion and death by making the Way of the Cross will be celebrated every Friday of Lent at 7:30 pm.

ASH WEDNESDAY: The holy season of Lent will begin on Wednesday, March 9th. Ashes will be imposed during the Eucharistic Celebrations at 8:00 am, 12 noon, 4 pm and 7:30 pm. SPRING IS ALMOST HERE

ARE YOU READY?

With spring just around the corner, it's time to remind everyone of the possibility of flooding in many areas of town. Heavy spring rains and spring thaws can bring about flooding and flood related problems.

Flash Flooding: Remember, when a roadway is under water "Turn Around, Don't Drown." If you are experiencing flash flooding in your area keep a careful eye on the situation. If the water is encroaching your property please be sure you move important papers and personal belongings above ground level. Make sure that all light lawn furniture is secured. Do not attempt to drive through the water-wait until it recedes.

River and Stream Flooding: River and stream flooding lasts much longer and has a greater chance of impact on personal property. If the streams and/or rivers are rising keep a close eye on the situation. Resources are listed below that will help you in determining what the situation is and what the potential might be. If evacuation is necessary please remember that we will do assisted evacuations only during daylight hours unless there is a medical emergency. It is always best to plan an evacuation route and prepare for evacuation ahead of time.

Listed below are local resources that may be of help during a flood emergency:

- "Are You Prepared" pamphlet for all emergency situations—available at Borough Hall, the Library and other locations throughout the Borough.
- **Emergency Management Hotline:** 973-694-0401, for information; road closures; evacuation requests; shelter availability—**DO NOT CALL 9-1-1 FOR THESE ISSUES**
- Cablevision Channel 77 will have updated information on the storm and on conditions throughout the Borough.
- Flood sirens are sounded in the event of a flood emergency—modulating siren means to move cars and/or belongings to higher ground—straight siren means evacuation is necessary
- If you have Verizon phone service at home you may receive a "**REVERSE 911**" call with recorded information. **PLEASE** do not hang up—listen to the message—this is information that you need to know.

Update on Recycling

Our recycling program has been hugely successful. We are averaging over 21 tons per week. That's over 2 million lbs. of material in 1 year's time. That is over 1000 ton which is no longer in the waste flow. Lincoln Park residents have done a great job.

Recycling Tips:

One problem we have encountered is the weather. Please remember if it is snowing we will not be able to pick up recycling.

The other problem is the wind. If the recycling is not secure – the wind will make a mess of things. I have found that by putting the materials in bags it is less likely to be blown around my yard.

Smaller households can use grocery bags to help keep recyclables manageable. You can put the mixed containers in your plastic grocery bags. Mail or other mixed paper can be put into brown paper grocery bags.

For households that are larger, I have found that using biodegradable paper leaf bags for the mixed paper works well. A clear plastic yard bag keeps all of the mixed containers organized.

Police News

As I sit here writing this, there have already been two decent sized snow storms and we have a good amount of winter still ahead of us. This is the perfect opportunity for a few reminders.

As was pointed out in a previous article, it is now required to remove accumulated ice or snow from a motor vehicle prior to its operation. Take the time to clean off the roof and hood of your car. The accumulated ice and snow pose a huge safety hazard for those who are following behind you.

The second item is in regards to sidewalks. "Borough code 185-2 requires the removal of all snow and ice from the abutting sidewalks of such public highway; street or avenue within twelve (12) hours of daylight after the same shall fall or otherwise be formed or accumulate thereon." Please shovel your sidewalks. Children going to and from school need to walk on the sidewalk, rather than the roadway. Along with that, I would also request that you not shovel, plow or use the snow blower to put snow back onto the street.

The final item I would like to address is on -street parking. A few years ago the ordinance prohibiting parking on the street overnight (from 3am to 6am) was removed. However, there are ordinances in effect that pertain to parking when snow is expected or when the roads are "snow covered". If there is snow, or a good chance it will happen, please do not park in the street. The plows need to get by to clear the roads. It makes it difficult for them to do their job, and at times they are unable to clear the road wide enough for emergency vehicles to pass through.
