## From the Desk of Mayor David Runfeldt

The New Jersey State League of Municipalities and I have an excellent scholarship opportunity for the High School Juniors and Seniors from Lincoln Park.

We have teamed up to offer three \$10,00.00 scholarships through the Louis Bay 2<sup>nd</sup> Future Municipal Leaders Scholarship Competition. This statewide scholarship competition centers on the theme "What My Mayor and Governing Body Do Best" and seeks to advance the virtues of elected and volunteer members of municipal government.

Many of the elected officials and appointed board members in the borough serve Lincoln Park with little or no compensation. It is their altruistic desire to serve their community which compels them to public service. These officials, along with a cadre of dedicated professionals, are guardians of our hometown comforts and security. They give of their time and talents to help plan our community and preserve our way of life. They serve us year-round, every day, and yet are hardly noticed. This scholarship competition will help rectify that, while encouraging our future municipal leaders. Full details of the application process and contest can be obtained by contacting my office at (973) 270-2020 or visiting the Administration Office on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the Municipal Building. I hope to see many of our young adults representing Lincoln Park in the Future Municipal Leaders Scholarship Competition.

For your information, here are some points regarding the 2008 Municipal Budget as Administration and Council head into this year's budget process. The municipal share of the 2007 overall tax bill was 33% of your taxes. The school share of the 2007 overall tax bill was 56% of your taxes. The county share of the 2007 overall tax bill was 11% of your taxes.

A tax point in Lincoln Park is \$ 75,000.00. This means that every time we need to raise \$75,000.00 not covered by revenue we need to increase the tax rate by 1 penny. The present 2007 tax rate for Lincoln Park is \$3.84 per thousand of assessed property value. The average home in Lincoln Park has an assessed value of approximately \$175,000. The 2007 taxes on the average home was \$6,720.00 which is broken down as follows:

Municipal	\$2,199.75
School	3,601.50
County	918.75

Each tax point increase will add an additional \$19.25 to the tax bill of the average home in Lincoln Park. There are several major increases which the borough must budget for in 2008 including increases to insurance premiums, increases to pension and social security contributions, an increase in the sewer rate from the Two Bridges Sewer Authority, appropriations to pay for damage caused by the flooding in April and increased mandated contribution to our public library.

Budget Hearings are open public meetings. Contact the Municipal Clerks Office for times and dates.

## Police News

**SNOW AND ICE ON ROOFS OF VEHICLES** - While it is almost sixty degrees on the day of this writing, it is safe to say that winter will return at some point. When it does please remember to ensure that ice and snow must be cleared off of the roofs of vehicles. It causes a tremendous hazard when driving on highways and a sheet of snow or ice blows off and onto other vehicles. It is illegal in New Jersey to operate a vehicle with such a situation, regardless of the fact that it could kill someone.

**GOALS FOR 2008** - Among our goals for the upcoming year in addition to the previously journal mentioned pedestrian safety zones in the center of town, is a continuation and possible expansion of the citizens police academy. This course, which was run in summer/ fall, was enormously popular and received tremendous feedback from the participants.

Also in the works is one geared toward our high school aged citizens. Applications have currently been sent out and are being received. Sgt. Michael Runfeldt has initiated a high school police academy, which will run for approximately six (6) weeks. In house, we are emphasizing officer safety with our police officers. Nationwide, 2007 was the deadliest year for police officers with 186 officers dying in the line of duty during the year. In towns both larger and much smaller than Lincoln Park the year was the deadliest since 1989 outside of 9/11. New Jersey alone had 4 officers killed in the line of duty last year.

**OUTSTANDING POLICE WORK** - On December 18, 2007 a week prior to Christmas police officers were dispatched to a business parking lot in town where two adult males approached a woman and committed a theft. One man distracted the victim while the other stole her purse. This theft was rather brazen and in the middle of the day. The motive was to get money for drugs, again dispelling the notion that drug use is a victimless crime spoken of in some circles.

The victim provided a description of the suspects but due to the time delay the suspects had long fled the scene. Dsgt. Michael Hackett heard the description and immediately linked it to a known drug offender he had observed within the prior 24 hours within the Borough. The Detective Bureau began an investigation. Within 24 hours two suspects had been developed and through a quick investigation, probable cause was developed on both suspects linking them to the crime.

Two arrests were made in this case thanks to Dsgt. Hackett knowing the people and community in which he works and quickly linking his observations to a crime and solving it in short order. This was a case of tremendous detective work and an excellent job by the detective Bureau and by Dsgt. Hackett in particular.

During the same time Detective Joseph Zammit was working on a burglary follow up investigation, which occurred in town. Again in a rapid investigation he successfully solved that crime, arrested the suspect for burglary and was able to recover the stolen jewelry for the homeowner. Not all crimes are solved this quickly and often it is difficult to proceed with little in the way of evidence or information.

**DARE/ COMMUNITY POLICING –** We wanted to inform everyone that Ptl. Heather Bailey has been assigned to the Auxiliary Services unit and will be in the schools instructing DARE amongst her other duties we are sure she will be a success and continue to succeed in this very popular program.

**NEW TELECOMMUNICATOR –** We would like to welcome Disp. William Morere as our newest telecommunicator. He has been in training since late December and is a welcome addition to the police communications unit. Disp. Morere also serves in the United States Army Reserve.

**PTL BONO PROGRESS -** Ptl. Michael Bono graduated the Morris County Police Academy after 6 months of basic training and as of this writing is still in field training. We anticipate his deployment onto a patrol squad sometime in February/ March.

### **LINCOLN PARK COLD CASE –**

During the coming months we will attempt to put in the article unsolved crimes from recent Burglaries to Homicides in the hopes of receiving information or jogging a memory from someone that might help a case at an impasse.

**Homicide August 2, 1995—Victim: Debra A. Walton** On Wednesday, August 2, 1995 at approximately 12:20 p.m., the victim, Debra A. Walton, Paterson, NJ, age 34, was discovered deceased in the Frassetto Industrial Park, Borinski Road and Frassetto Way, Lincoln Park, NJ. The victim was last known to be alive on Friday, 7/28/95 at approximately 2:00 a.m. at the intersection of Passaic Street & Cianci Street, Paterson, NJ. She was last seen wearing a pink sleeveless V-Neck sweater, black skirt, pink 6-inch platform shoes, a rolled scarf across her forehead (like a headband) and was carrying a black purse with a long strap. The victim was a known prostitute who died as a result of Blunt Trauma. The victim was brought alive or deceased to Lincoln Park during the summer time of 1995. Anyone with any information is asked to contact the Lincoln Park Detective Bureau.

Printing will only be possible with the establishment of an account set up at the circulation desk. If funds are available in the account, printing will be allowed and an amount of money will be automatically taken from the account per page printed.

Patrons with fines over a specified amount, lost books or invalid library cards will be barred from using the public computers until these problems are rectified.

Patrons will be warned before their session is ended and before the computers shut down at the end of the day.

There will be one express PC which will allow a quick check of the library catalog only.

Visitors will be issued temporary cards which will expire at the end of a limited session. They will receive less time than registered patrons.

Additional M.A.I.N, Inc. (Morris Automated Information Network) libraries are expected to acquire SAM in the near future.

## History of Lincoln Park

### The Borough

Continued from last month

"As a sign of progress in 1936 publication of the *Lincoln Park Herald* was started. For a few months in 1882 *The Eagle* was circulated here but its life was as brief as its news coverage. In the early 1920's a good, local newspaper called *The News Letter* was published monthly but suspended after several years. Previous to the birth of the *Herald* the *Butler Argus* was the official town newspaper.

"The Big Tree", an old maple, had stood in the center of Route 202 and Main Street for over 100 years. Each year the matter of cutting down the old tree would come before the council but friends always procured an extra lease on life until finally because it was completely dead, it had to be taken down in 1939. Many travelers passing through Lincoln Park remembered the name for one or both of two reasons: The old tree in the center of town or the summons received for some traffic violation. It has been claimed that many an old deed takes the old maple tree as a starting point. The old Farmers Hotel located where the Shell station now stands had stood on that spot since Civil War days, and many were the old canal boaters who hurried up the mules in anticipation of wetting their whistles at the old hotel, owned and operated by Daniel Zeliffe for over 50 years. It witnessed the passing of the ox cart, the horse, the canal and finally prohibition. It was torn down in 1940.

Another old landmark to vanish in the past few years was the building at the foot of Chapel Hill and Boonton Turnpike. For years James Munson Zeliffe's blacksmith shop operated there catering not only to the local farmers but doing a thriving business shoeing the canal mules. With the passing of the horse and buggy it ceased to operate shortly after World War I and in later years was variously used as a lunch room and confectionary store. Many a lad tarried at the old forge on his way home from school. Upon occasion Mr. Zeliffe would fashion a ring for him made from a bright horse shoe nail or better yet would make him a button in an old brass button mold.

Mr. Zeliffe lived in the old stone house at the center of town and had found this pre-revolutionary war button mold under the eaves while doing some roof repairs. The wooden handles had disintegrated upon touching but the brass mold itself was in working condition. The Paterson museum desired the item but it is still in the possession of Mr. Zeliffe's grandson who prizes it highly.

If in the mood another exciting adventure was to be permitted to shoo the flies while Mr.

Zeliffe shoed the horse. The horsefly switch was generally a horse's tail with the boney part of the tail serving as a handle.

Lincoln Park's greatest growth came with the expiration of World War II. The great industrial expansion which took place in the metropolitan area brought thousands of new residents from all parts of the United State. The returning G.I.'s were getting married and these two factors plus the shortage of homes due to suspension of building during the war created a tremendous demand for new homes.

The first development after the war was in the Ernsville section. Then a number of houses along Rout 202 between Mountain View and the center of town and finally Comly Estates. Elsewhere in all sections of the town individual homes were being erected and where many years ago there were woods and pastures, today we see attractive homes and green lawns."
