It is with great sadness that I inform you of the passing of former Councilman Herman "Hy" Nadel. Councilman Nadel lost his courageous battle with a brain tumor on May 9th.

Hy had been a Lincoln Park resident since 1966. Along with his wife Lynn, the Nadels raised their two children, Mac and Rosalyn in the neighborhood he continued to live in until his passing. Hy served the public in many ways for many years and was always a champion for all that is good in our community.

Prior to his terms serving as Councilman from Ward I, Hy had been involved with creating a business association in town, was elected to the School Board and was a Past President of the Lincoln Park Republican Club. While sitting on Council, he served on the Municipal Utilities Authority, the Two Bridges Sewer Authority and was the Council Liaison to the Lincoln Park Fire Department. Due to his need to focus on his health and his desire to make sure the residents of Ward I were adequately represented, Hy resigned his Council seat on February 2nd of this year.

I have known Hy for most of my life. Thirty years ago, he along with my parents and several other Lincoln Park business owners were involved with the LP Business and Professional Association. This was among my first exposures to community service and politics. Other than my parents, Hy may have been the most influential person in my political upbringing. He was a sitting member of Council when I served my first term as a Councilman. He was always understanding, supportive and full of ideas. Hy served on countless committees and boards in dedicated service to the residents of Lincoln Park. He would always speak his mind and was not afraid to let his opinion be known. In short, Hy Nadel had all of the best qualities we can hope for in a public official. He will be missed by me and by the entire community he had been a part of for so long.

News From The Police Desk

The Police Department has been using the Morris County Emergency Notification system to notify residents of flood warnings, road closures and various other potential emergencies. The Morris County system allows us to rapidly notify specific sections of the Borough, as well as the entire Borough itself, if the need exists. The message has always been broadcast to your home telephone.

There has been a recent modification to the Morris County system. The system now allows residents to add their cell phone to the system. This allows calls that are made to specific addresses within our jurisdiction to include a notification call to your cell phone, in addition to the call that will still be placed to your residence. You can register up to four cell phones for your address.

To register your cell phone number, you need to go on-line to the following website: <https://morriscounty.onthealert.com/>

You will need to fill in all the information on the page. It is important to remember that this is not an instant update, but could take a couple of months.

We used the Emergency Notification system quite frequently when we were experiencing the heavy rains and flooding during the end of March and beginning of April. Now that our weather has been a little better, I am hoping that if you haven't done so already that you will sign up for the cell phone notification feature.

The Police Department tries to notify the residents with every means possible when we have some type of emergency. This feature is just another tool that will help us get you the information during emergent times.

New Laws

Source: NJLM Legislative Bulletin, March, 2010 Session

New Laws:

A-2784: Permits municipalities to set strict absentee policies for service on authorities, boards and commissions

S-562: Provides triggers for reductions of employer unemployment insurance taxes

S-1303: Defines “inherently beneficial use” for purposes of zoning variance and specifically includes facilities and structures that supply electrical energy produced from wind, solar, or photovoltaic technologies.

S-1816: Authorizes counties and municipalities to acquire real property, and to resell or lease it with agricultural deed restrictions attached, for farmland preservation purposes.

S-2372: Permits revenue received by municipality as payments in lieu of taxes to increase cap base upon which permissible increases to final appropriations are calculated under local cap law

A-3541: Extends deadline for municipal certified recycling coordinator requirements

A-1645: Redefines role and qualifications of purchasing agent in “Local Public Contract Law”

S-869: Permits municipalities to adopt Ordinance requiring bond from landlords in certain circumstances

A-3657: Concerns extension of certain local government financial agreements

A-436: Permits price adjustments in local public contracts for asphalt cement and fuel.

A-1263: Affords employment protection to certain volunteer emergency responders

A-4338: Permits member of volunteer fire company and emergency response squad to hold municipal elective office

S-1538: Concerns biomass, solar, and wind energy generation on farms

A-1882: Permits three year payoff of accumulated deficits of municipal health insurance funds

A-2178: Permits surcharge of up to 22% to offset private collection fees for certain delinquent debts owed to courts, counties and municipalities

A-3740: provides for regulation of small wind energy systems by municipalities

A-4313: Revises procedures for reassessment of certain real property by assessor and appeal of assessment by certain property tax payers.

S-1082: Permits municipality to determine permissible parking distance from intersection, crosswalks or “stop” signs

S-1234: Establishes criteria municipalities and counties are to consider when establishing speed limits

A-823: Regulates operation of snowmobiles, all-terrain vehicles, and dirt bikes, and certain other vehicles and off-road vehicles; requires DEP to designate three sites on State-owned land where snowmobiles, all-terrain vehicles; and dirt bikes may be used

A-3317: Revises conditions to qualify for exemptions from electrical contracting permit requirements for electrical installation, repair and maintenance work done by public employees on public property

A-3698: Provides for specified alternative proposals and base specifications for certain public contracts; requires contracting unit to specify basis for determining lowest responsible bid and criteria for selection of alternate bids

A-4063: Establishes the “New Jersey Foreclosure Fairness Act”; imposes additional foreclosure notice requirements; amends “Mortgage Stabilization and Relief Act”

A-4341: Authorizes increased grant funding to local governments for site remediation for redevelopment of contaminated property for renewable energy projects

S-2479: Increases penalties for failing to yield to pedestrian when pedestrian is seriously injured

A-557: Repeals bidding requirement for local public contracts to allow bidders to avoid unresponsive bid if they inadvertently omit business registration from bid proposal provided that bidder was registered before bid submission deadline

A-807: Authorizes court to provide alternatives for persons who default in payment of fines.

A-1329: Revises laws concerning pedestrian safety and traffic control; requires drivers to stop and remain stopped for pedestrians under certain circumstances

A-1619: Revises certain statutes concerning sale of tax and other municipal liens

A-3396: Provides authorized emergency vehicles protection under lemon law

A-4303: Provides that certain drunk driving offenders who drive with a suspended driver's license are guilty of a fourth degree crime

A-4347: Extends expiration date of certain permits pursuant to “Permit Extension Act of 2008”

HURRICANE SEASON IS HERE—June through September ARE YOU READY?

We all know that the hurricane season has started – the question is – are you prepared in the event that either a hurricane or tropical storm hits Lincoln Park?

Tropical Storms (Floyd was a tropical storm when it hit in 1999) and hurricanes can do significant damage and bring with them the following hazards: Flash flooding, river and stream flooding, wind damage, power outages. Here are some quick tips:

Flash Flooding: Remember, when a roadway is under water “Turn Around, Don’t Drown”. If you are experiencing flash flooding in your area keep a careful eye on the situation. If the water is encroaching your property please be sure you move important papers and personal belongings above ground level. Make sure that all light lawn furniture is secured. Do not attempt to drive through the water – wait until it recedes.

River and Stream Flooding: River and Stream flooding lasts much longer and has a greater chance of impact on personal property. If the streams and/or rivers are rising keep a close eye on the situation. Resources are listed below that will help you in determining what the situation is and what the potential might be. If evacuation is necessary please remember that we will do assisted evacuations only during daylight hours unless there is a medical emergency. It is always best to plan an evacuation route and prepare for evacuation ahead of time. Our shelter will be open during any tropical storm or hurricane event.

Wind Damage: Wind can cause a great deal of damage to your property. Take a look at your property and see if there are any trees that might be a problem during high winds. You may find it useful to take proactive steps if a condition exists that could damage your home or your neighbor’s property. If you are going on vacation – or if a storm is predicted – please be sure to secure all lawn furniture and ornaments. Umbrellas, chairs, etc. can break windows and can damage cars when they are airborne.

Power Outages: Downed trees and wires can cause power outages that last for a long time. Should your power go out, shut off all appliances that were on with the exception of one light. This will let you know when the power comes back. Be sure you have surge protectors for all audio and video equipment as well as computers. Make sure that such equipment is powered down during an outage. Use only battery operated lamps and flashlights for lighting. Make sure you have a source to boil water that does not require electricity. Make sure you have water available since the storm may affect water pressure. **Cordless phones** do not operate during a power outage. The “old fashioned” phones will still be operable if telephone lines are unaffected. See if you can find an old one somewhere in the attic or basement and keep it handy. Be sure you have a car charger for cell phones as the outage may well last longer than the battery on your phone. **Refrigerators and freezers** should be kept closed as much as possible. Each time they are opened lessens the amount of time the food will stay good. Make sure all food from refrigerators and/or freezers is checked before using.

Good things to have on hand: bottled water; a hand operated can opener; lanterns, flashlights (battery operated); a portable radio; canned foods that do not require cooking.
