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## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The past 2 years have been unprecedented in recent public health history. SARS-CoV-2 has proven to be unpredictable and unrelenting in its march across New Jersey, the United States and the world. The emergence of new variants that evade vaccines have created multiple waves requiring continued public health response and community vigilance. We were hopeful that “COVID” would behave similarly to the 1918 Spanish Flu in the sense that we would be “over it” in a year or 2, but the Coronavirus (*Family Coronaviridae*) has certain characteristics that have made it highly transmissible. The world witnessed 2 previous bouts with other coronaviruses. In 2002, SARS (Sudden Acute Respiratory Syndrome), and in 2012, MERS (Middle Eastern Respiratory Syndrome) created worldwide fears and a coordinated public health plan. Many novel viruses have emerged because they jump from one species to another, such as from bats to humans. Another hurdle that public health professionals have encountered is the lack of trust in science and the healthcare professionals that relay it. Sadly, public health has battled misconceptions and falsehoods on everything from masks to vaccines. Anger from parents and the general community has been directed at professionals that have their best interests at heart. We are the same individuals that have worked tirelessly for years to protect residents in all areas of public and environmental health, and will continue to do so.

### Mission Statement

The mission of the Lincoln Park Health Department is to prevent, promote, and protect all individuals within the community. We stand by assuring each person whether that is a resident or an individual who steps foot into Lincoln Park is surrounded by a culture of health. Our duty is to prevent diseases, promote a healthy living, and to protect the public from health hazards. These roles are fulfilled as we provide valuable health services, educational opportunities, outdoor experiences, partnerships for health promotion, environmental stewardship and emergency preparedness.

### Overview

The Lincoln Park Health Department employs best practices to meet the “Ten Essential Public Health Services.” This is accomplished through the oversight of a licensed Health Officer, Public Health Nurse, Registered Environmental Health Specialists, Certified Health Education Specialist, Certified Registrar of Vital Statistics and Animal Control Officer. Contract services are provided for a board-certified pediatrician and family practitioner. Shared services’ agreements with other municipalities enable us to meet the Public Health Practice Standards while providing cost savings to the Borough of Lincoln Park. The Borough of Lincoln Park has shared services’ agreements with the Borough of Ringwood, and Townships of Pequannock and Bloomfield.

The Lincoln Park Health Department has been part of the North Jersey Health Collaborative for the past 10 years. Established in October 2013, the North Jersey Health Collaborative (NJHC) is an independent, self-governed 501© (3) organization with a diverse set of partners in five counties of New Jersey (Morris, Passaic, Sussex, Union, & Warren) representing healthcare, public health, social service, education, local government, business, and other community-based organizations. Working together across sectors, the NJHC and its partners seek to establish a more coordinated collective approach to community health improvement. Core functions of the NJHC include a shared process of community health needs assessment and health improvement planning to target factors that drive poor health, and the development of collaborative strategies and action plans designed to create communities where opportunities for health and well-being are available for all people. This report is part of our continued commitment to collect, analyze, and share data to inform and modify the collective health improvement efforts of more than 100 partner organizations. Based upon the 2021 Community Health Needs Assessment, the following priorities were identified.

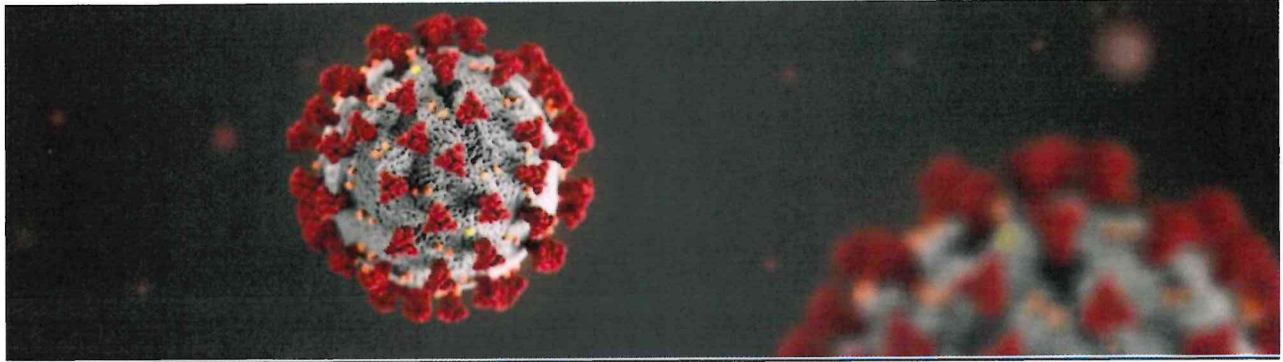

# LINCOLN PARK AND COVID-19

## SARS-CoV-2 Pandemic



With the dawn of 2021, public health and healthcare were in the thick of the pandemic. Based on the history of the 1918/1919 Spanish Flu, we were hopeful that we only had to ensure another few months before the pandemic was behind us. New nomenclature was becoming part of everyday conversations, such as “messenger RNA,” “rate of transmission,” “fully vaccinated” and “boosted.” The evolution of new variants led us through the Greek alphabet, using terms such as “variant of interest” and “variant of concern.” Healthcare and non-healthcare individuals were served daily doses of case, fatality and vaccination rates, while color-coded CALI scores and a plethora of graphs and charts were created. Everyone knew at least one person who was either a case or a close contact.

With the advent of vaccines from 3 different manufacturers, local, county, regional and mega-site vaccine clinics emerged, creating an early frenzy to secure a dose. Scheduling glitches, long lines and patience were part of the process. Vaccination rates climbed as more residents secured a dose and cases began to drop. The warm weather and rebirth of nature that comes with spring created a sense of optimism that we might be returning to normal. To borrow from Alexander Pope:

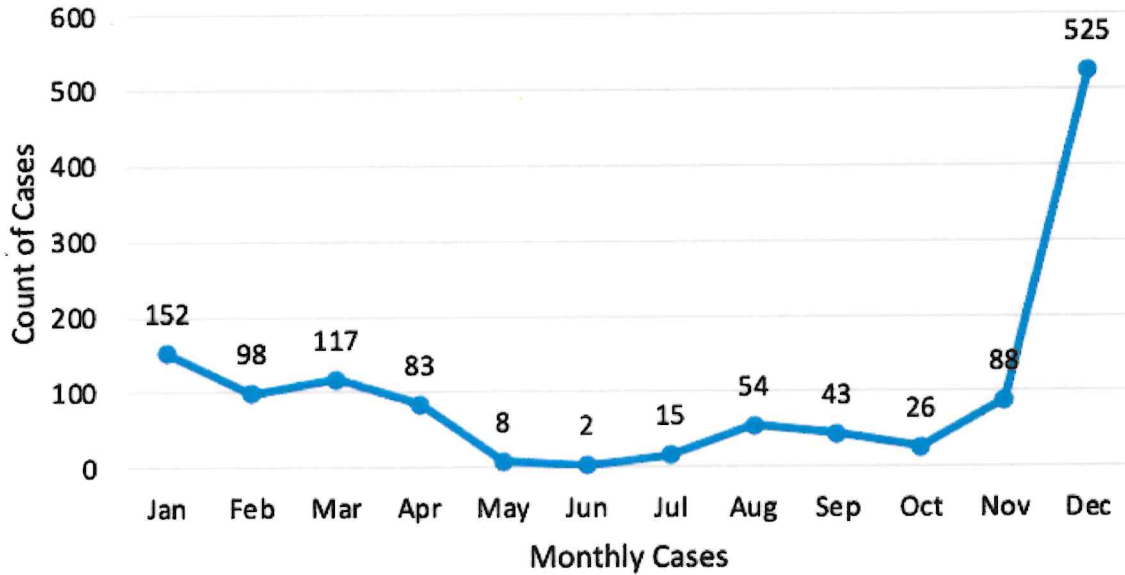
*“Hope springs eternal in the human breast:

Summer brought a dramatic drop in cases and a return to everyday activities and socialization. Unfortunately, the emergence of new variants, Delta and Omicron, brought back a surge of cases in September, with a dramatic spike at the end of the year. As we navigate through this new wave, we are still hopeful that we will prevail.

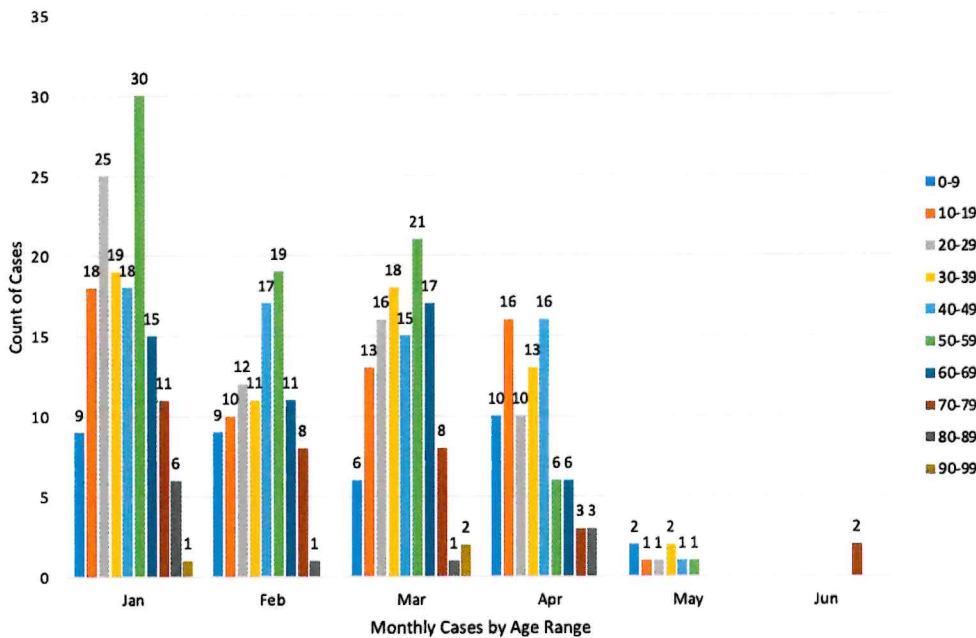
## Lincoln Park COVID-19 Cases in 2021

### Lincoln Park COVID-19 Cases by Month and Age Range From January - June 2021

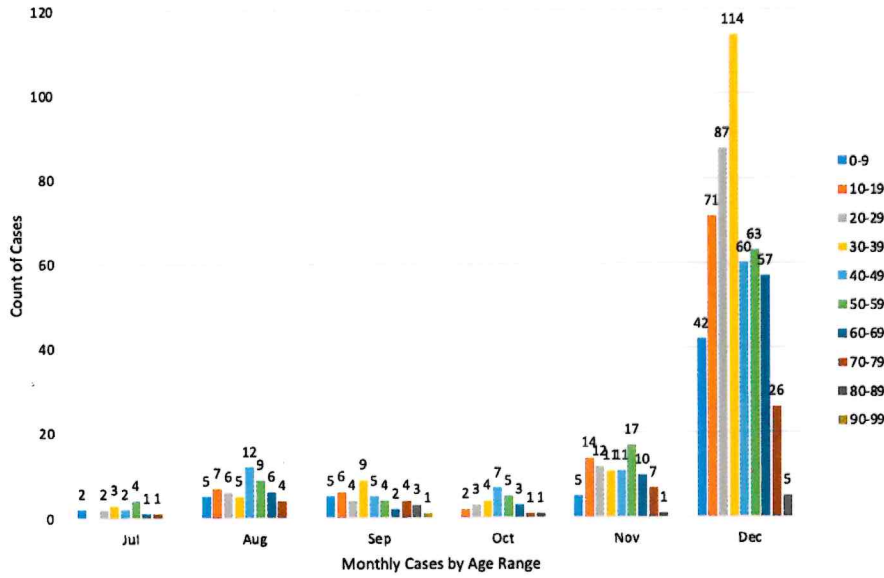

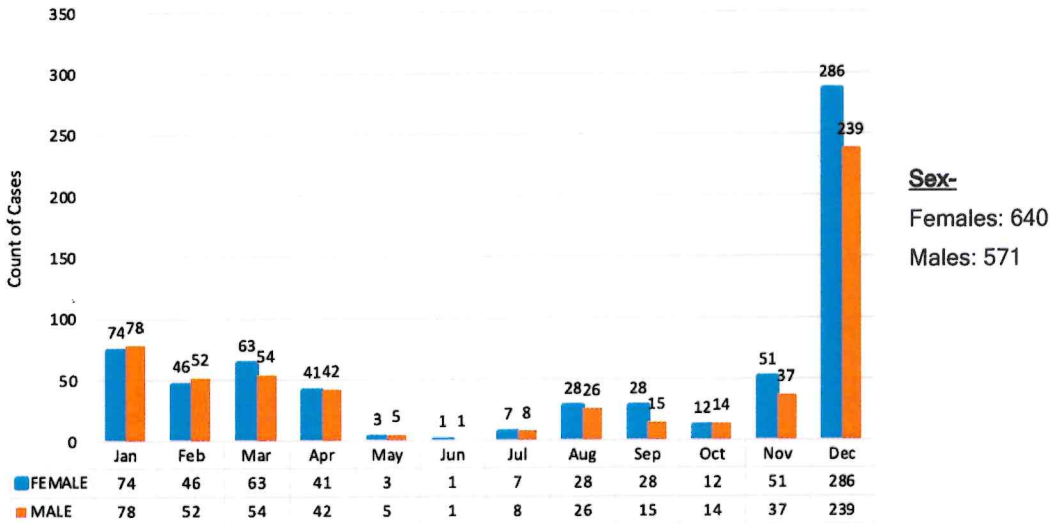

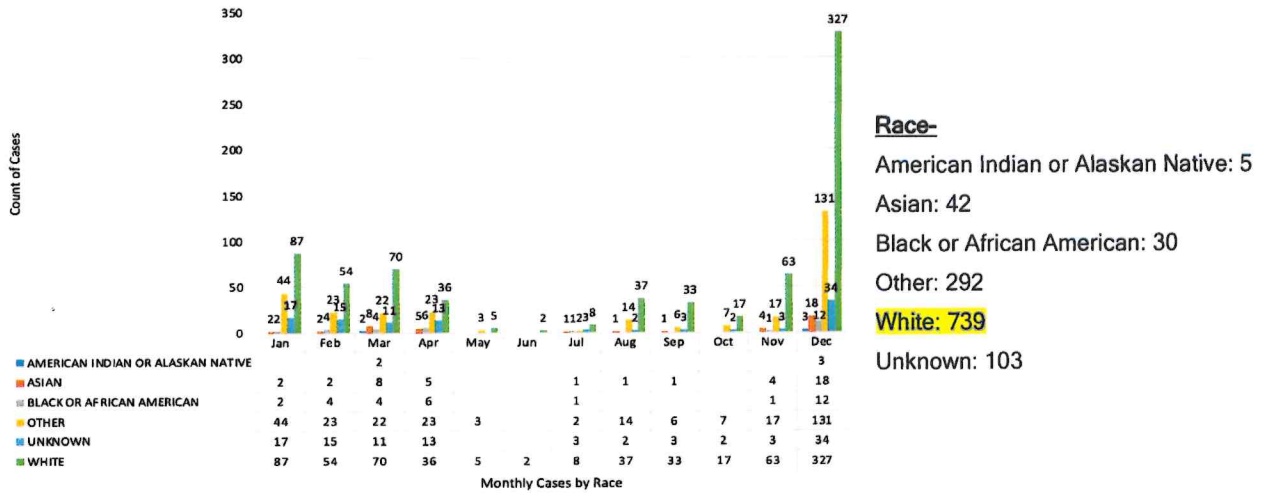
Lincoln Park COVID-19 Cases by Month and Age Range From July - January 2021

## SERVICES OFFERED

The Lincoln Park Health Department offers many essential services for the community to improve the health of people that live, work and play in Lincoln Park. This is achieved through health and wellness programs, disease investigations, health education/screenings, and environmental stewardship.

### DOG Licensing/ Registrations Tag/ Immunization

It is a New Jersey state mandate that dogs need to be licensed annually, and have a valid rabies certificate that is good through October 31<sup>st</sup> of the licensing year.



#### Benefits of Dog Licensure

- Licensed dogs are vaccinated against rabies and those current license tags on their collars are considered generally protected from the disease.
- A licensed dog that wanders off the owner's property or gets lost can be traced and quickly returned to its owner by animal control officers.
- When individuals are bitten by a licensed dog, the dog is placed under a 10-day confinement and observation that will prevent the victim from needing to begin rabies prophylaxis.
- Dog licensing is mandatory in all New Jersey municipalities and the licensing fee is much less than the fines and penalties for have unlicensed dogs.
- License fees support animal control, animal sheltering and rabies control activities within the municipality.
- Dog licensing fees help fund testing of suspected rabid wildlife, the free state sponsored municipal rabies vaccination clinics and the state operated low cost spay and neuter program.

### Chicken and Hen Licensing

The Borough of Lincoln Park requires a license for the raising, keeping and maintaining of chickens/hens. Chicken/hen coops must be maintained at all times. In no case shall any person or persons be permitted to keep in the Borough more than 8 chickens/hens on their property. No roosters are allowed.

### Miniature Pig Licensing

No person shall keep, harbor or maintain a miniature pig without first obtaining a license to be issued by the Health Department. This application should be made and renewed in the month of January every year. The miniature pig shall be spayed or neutered and a certification from a licensed veterinarian must be submitted with the application for the license. In no case shall any person or persons be permitted to keep in the Borough more than 2 miniature pigs on their property.

### Annual Rabies Clinics - Animal Control

Both Morris County and Lincoln Park provides free rabies vaccinations that protect pets in the community.



## Senior Services

The Lincoln Park Seniors' meetings are held in St. Joseph's Church basement twice a month. They are short meetings, along with a guest speaker, or individuals will play games such as bingo or trivia. Those who attend the meeting receive refreshments and on special days there are luncheons. Transportation is available to those who either cannot drive or do not have a way of getting to/from the meetings. This transportation is a program run among five towns, including Lincoln Park, through Dial-A-Ride.

## Employee Wellness Programs

**Annual Physical Exams:** Participants were required to obtain a full physical from their Primary Care Physician. The physical should include a Routine Blood Work Component consisting of a Complete Blood Count (CBC), Chemistry Panel, Urinalysis, Lipid Profile (cholesterol) and Blood sugar.

**Dental Cleaning/Exam:** Participants were required to obtain a dental cleaning and exam from a dentist.

**Fitness:** Participants had to complete a fitness evaluation.

**Educational Seminars:** Participants were required to attend two seminars which were conducted in the form of a video presentation that lasted between 30-60 minutes. The topics varied, but could include areas such as stress management practices and techniques, nutrition, etc.

## GRANTS

The Borough of Lincoln Park continues to be the recipient of several grants during 2021:

- 1) The Health Department completed the 2<sup>nd</sup> year of our 2020-2021 New Jersey Healthy Communities Grant through the generous \$20,000 donation from the Chilton Medical Center/Atlantic Health System, and the New Jersey Healthy Communities Network (NJHCN). This grant provided a climbing rock wall and FX GAME ZONE for the Lincoln Park Elementary School (LPES) and yoga mats/equipment plus a bicycle desk for the Lincoln Park Middle School (LPMS).
- 2) The Health Department was awarded a \$27,260 grant from the Morris County Trail Program for a design and permitting to expand our canal trail.

The Lincoln Park Health Department has secured over \$100,000 in various grants since 2015, and we continue to seek funding that benefits the health and wellbeing of our residents and environment.
